# Thank you to our outgoing council members:

#### **Winter Notes:**

**Compost:** Closed for the season to make room for snow from Main Avenue.

<u>Winter Parking:</u> Is in effect through April 30, 2025. No vehicle can be parked on the street in excess of 24 hours. No parking zones move your vehicle off Main Street if it is snowing.

<u>Snow removal:</u> The city will start snow removal within 24 hours of a snow event (3 inches or more, unless the wind conditions prompt an event.) If you know it is going to snow, move your vehicle off the street. If you see the plows out and you are parked on the street - move your vehicle to a plowed area. The city will do a final cleanup after an event. Some events are continuous due to drifting or continued snow. The city could have a vehicle towed if not moved. Per State Statute 169.42 you cannot plow, dump, blow, or shovel snow into any roadway.

<u>Hydrants, etc.</u>: If you have a hydrant in your neighborhood, please help to keep it cleared. It not only protects the property on which it is located, but the entire neighborhood. Also, do not park in front of driveways or mailboxes

# Council Briefs: 12/3/2024 & 12/9/2024

**12/3/2024:** Council held the 1<sup>st</sup> Truth in Taxation hearing and budget workshop. Guests: A Hartley, L VanDeest, J Tauber. Noone attended foe the hearing and council proceeded with the budget workshop. After brief discussion due to the 125<sup>th</sup>, projects and staffing, the consensus of the council was to leave the levy/budget at the preliminary amount.

**12/9/2024: Guests:** Doug Hanson – Winthrop Publications, Residents Jessica Tauber – 551 5<sup>th</sup> Street, and Joe Robertson – 251 7<sup>th</sup> Street.

Public Hearing: for certifying delinquent accounts and 2<sup>nd</sup> Truth in Taxation . No one attended - mayor closed hearing.

Approved: Agenda and Consent Agenda including the 11/13 & 12/3 minutes & bills totaling \$73,548.39 the treasurer's report including the bank reconciliation for November, receipts of \$198,205.16, 2024 payrolls 24, 2<sup>nd</sup> half council, annual fire ambulance and one 2024-2025 sump pump waivers for Kapolczynski Reports: Fox: Submitted report & updates: a person interested in donating benches, WWTF repairs completed, Water Plant inspected earlier for the "Safe Drinking Water Act received a 68 page report showing compliance. Shared information to contact members of congress to continue the low-income household water assistance program permanently.

**Tauber:** Attended STREAMS. **Burger:** Submitted report and presented a payment plan – council approved, gWorks onboarding set for January 6. **Peterson:** Next 125<sup>th</sup> is 12/18 @ 6pm. **Klingler:** New firefighters in their 2<sup>nd</sup> week of training. **Unfinished Business:** Fox updated council on the progress of all the projects and funding. **RO:** council approved moving forward with USDA loans, if the other fundings fall through.

**Stormwater**: updated council on the grant expenditures/reimbursements. **STREAMS**: Met on and shared concerns, worked on next steps. Tech team will contact MPCA & PFA to determine potential limits and understanding of loans and grants. STERAMS will be presenting at the DNR Roundtable 1/10/2025.

**New Business:** 1st reading of Ord. 150 An electrical franchise, set public hearing – full ordinance listed on the website. Approved certifying delinquent bills, December donation from Fillmeup bucket of \$22 to the 125th celebrations, 2025 fire officers, 2025 budget & levy General Fund \$236.003, RS Fiber \$35,385, ambulance assessment \$6,600 an increase of \$30,942. Burger updated council of the changes with the Small Cities Development Program (SCDP) DEED revamping program, Burger will contact DEED with council's questions. CUP Application public hearing waived until February meeting. Year-end moves: ambulance to GF \$530.99, \$32,000 PW to PW project & equipment fund, \$7,200 from fire to the fire equipment fund, \$4,800 from ambulance to fire for stall rent, \$10,560 from water to Temp water GO fund for RO project to cover the fund deficit.

The next meeting will be held January 13, 2025 at 7pm in the council chambers 791 Main Avenue.

# Plastics recycling:

Will continue. Any organization can register to collect and receive a bench. Only stretchable plastics, clean and dry. Salt bags with handles need to be cut off. NO dog food bags.
